Collins, our contact at Holy Cross (and the gentleman who so kindly comes to pick up our regular dona-





Northwest Hills Church is honored to support TWO different Food Pantries. The one we support all year (the bin in the Commons) and then with special requests for needed items — and special holidays like the Thanksgiving meals — is the Holy Cross Lutheran Church Food Pantry (4117 Terrace Dr.), and our wonderful friend there, Rohn Collins, is the one who picks up our donations.

The other one is the Project Hope Food Pantry, located at Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church (off N. 60th St.). We support them through the "Direct Your Dollars" Program at all Family Fare grocery stores. When you bring your Family Fare receipts to the drop-off box in the Commons, these are aggregated with other receipts, and when hitting a certain amount, Family Fare cuts a sizeable check to Project Hope — the last one was \$1,000! — so that Project Hope can purchase much needed pantry items! So both are a win-win situation when the body of Christ partners together to meet the needs of the community! Whichever way you choose to help — either by bringing non-

Have you seen the box above the coatrack in the Commons labeled "Eyeglasses" and wonder what it's for? Our Northwest Hills Church family for years has partnered with the local Lions Club "Recycle for Sight" Program! Refractive errors can be easily corrected with eyeglasses, yet millions living in low and middle income countries lack access to basic eye care services. Lions have recognized the urgent need for corrective lenses and collect usable glasses in their communities. When you bring and drop off your old glasses - whether they are reading glasses or prescription glasses - to the box in our Commons, those glasses are then taken to an official Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center for processing. There, the glasses are sorted to determine those that are usable or unusable. processed, and placed in inventory for distribution to optical missions around the world. Even the "unusable" glasses don't go to waste! The Lions Club "Recycle for Sight" Program also helps to minimize landfill waste by supporting precious metal reclamation and scrap processing for damaged glasses that are unusable. So it's a win-win situation! Thank you in advance for bringing your old and/or unused glasses to our collection box! You are making a difference around the world!

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

When the month of July comes around, our eyes see lots of red, white, and blue, our ears hear lots of patriotic songs, and our minds are full of thoughts of freedom. What does freedom mean to you? We enjoy many freedoms: the freedom of speech, the freedom to peaceably assemble, the freedom of religion, and the freedom to bear arms. All of these (and more) are guaranteed in the U.S. Bill of Rights.

What about in the church—what does freedom mean to us as Christians? Just as the United States of America is about freedom, our faith is also about freedom. The apostle Paul emphatically states in his letter to the Galatian church that "it is for freedom that Christ has set us free" (Galatians 5:1). But does this mean that we can do anything we want? Well, Paul has more to say on this...

"It is absolutely clear that God has called you to a free life. Just make sure that you don't use this freedom as an excuse to do whatever you want to do and destroy your freedom. Rather, use your freedom to serve one another in love; that's how freedom grows. For everything we know about God's Word is summed up in a single sentence: Love others as you love yourself. That's an act of true freedom."

Galatians 5:13-14 (The Message)

As followers of Jesus, each of us are free to live as we think is best (with guidance from the Holy Spirit, of course!). But our freedom does have limits. Our guiding principle in our everyday living should be this commandment, "Love others as you love yourself." We are called to love and care for ourselves but also to love and care for others. In our freedom, we, like Paul, should follow the example set by Jesus who humbled himself and became a servant to all.

Some interesting facts about Independence Day...

"...July 4th, to many people, means flags, freedom, and fireworks. It's one of the biggest holidays in the United States, celebrated with fireworks, parades, and barbecues. It is a day that is steeped in history and tradition. Every year, Americans celebrate the anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. While you may be familiar with basic facts about the holiday, some fascinating facts are lesser-known. For example, did you know that the Liberty Bell is tapped 13 times every July 4th? Or that John Adams believed that the Fourth of July was the wrong day to celebrate? Check out these interesting facts about Independence Day that will make you see the holiday in a whole new light.

John Hancock inspired a saying we still use today.

"Put your John Hancock here." Have you ever heard that phrase? We all know the person is asking for your signature, but why is that a common saying? As it turns out, John Hancock, who served as president of the Continental Congress, was the first signer of the Declaration of Independence. But it's not just that. His signature was large, flourishing, and very noticeable It was risky business to sign it – treason, to be exact. According to legend, he wanted King George to be able to read it without his glasses, which is why it's so big.

John Adams thought Americans should celebrate on July 2nd and turned down invitations to celebrate on July 4th in protest. The Continental Congress voted on July 2, 1776, to declare independence from England. The Congress formally adopted the Declaration two days later, with the Liberty Bell ringing to celebrate the historic event. Because the vote took place on July 2nd, Adams believed this should be the day Americans celebrate each year. He said as much in a letter to his wife. "The Second Day of July 1776, will be the most memorable Epocha in the History of America..." While he wasn't right about the date, he was correct in how Americans would celebrate the occasion each year with "pomp and parade." So stubborn in his belief that July 2nd was the correct date, he declined invitations to appear at events on the 4th of July.

Fireworks have been a tradition since the first Independence Day anniversary celebration in 1777. However, Adams' recommendation had little to do with it since fireworks had been part of celebrations in many countries, particularly royal celebrations, for hundreds of years. There's no denying that fireworks and freedom go hand in hand. George Washington was the first to celebrate the holiday with alcohol. The Revolutionary War was still going on in 1778 when Washington ordered a double ration of rum for his troops. They also did an artillery salute to commemorate the anniversary. Nowadays, most Americans celebrate with beer and wine.

July 4th became an official holiday in 1870.

Although Americans began celebrating the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence the very next year of its adoption, the date didn't become established as a national holiday until 1870. Further, federal employees weren't paid for the holiday until 1938. Each year, descendants of the Founding Fathers gather around the Liberty Bell to tap it 13 times to honor the original 13 colonies. It hasn't been rung since February 26, 1846, on George Washington's birthday, due to the hairline fracture that turned into a large crack that could not be repaired.

More than 150 million hot dogs are consumed on July 4th.

The National Hot Dog & Sausage Council reports that Americans consume 150 million hot dogs on Independence Day. The summer months are peak hot dog season, with 38% of hot dogs sold between Memorial Day in May and Labor Day in September. This coincides with cookout season nd baseball season, so it's no wonder so many wieners are eaten during this time. Nathan's Famous Hot Dogs hosts a hot dog eating contest for competitive eaters every year on this holiday. The competition lasts 10 minutes with one goal: to eat more hot dogs than anyone else. Two winners (one from the men's and women's categories) receive a trophy and the famous Mustard Belt of champions. In 2021, the male winner Joey Chestnut ate 76 hot dogs, while the female winner, Michelle Lesco, ate 30.75 hot dogs.

Americans spend about \$1.5 billion on fireworks in July.

Fireworks celebrations occur annually across the country on July 4th, but how much do those illuminating celebrations cost? According to WalletHub, Americans spent \$1.5+ billion on fireworks in 2020, enjoying more than 14,000 fireworks displays. Consumer fireworks purchases account for the largest portion of fireworks sales. Interestingly, beer and wine spending for a holiday is comparable at \$1.45 billion, which may account for the many yearly fireworks injuries..."


